




Figure 4. Principal components analysis results; 300 most frequent words and 133 most frequent function words. Behn's comedies.

# Behn's Prose: Keywords

- Top 11 topic-related keywords when compared with contemporary prose:
  - grate, besought, negroes, headsman, sack, eel, plantation, colony, toiled, murderer, devout
- 11 style-related keywords identified when compared with contemporary prose:
  - Third-person pronouns (her, him, she, he, they)
  - Conjunctions (and, or, when, while)
  - Determiner (this)
